God, be merciful to me, a sinner!

Today's Gospel contains one of Jesus' most powerful parables. There is no disguising that we have to choose a side, and there is also no disguising which side Jesus hopes we choose.

In the parable, the Pharisee doesn't actually talk to God at all; he talks to himself. He congratulates himself for being so great. He tells himself what a perfect Pharisee he is, how he does everything right. He compares himself favourably with the poor, wretched sinner over there in the corner at the back of the temple. The Pharisee forgets to address God in prayer; so it's not surprising that his prayer goes unheard, because it's not a prayer at all; it's more like a home-video of the Pharisee's greatest achievements.

The tax collector is another story altogether: A wretched human being who is so ashamed of himself that he doesn't have the courage to raise his eyes to heaven. But the message of the Old Testament is important: "the prayer of the humble pierces the clouds"; God hears his cry for forgiveness.

There is another difference between these two people. The Pharisee talks about what he does: he thinks he is valuable in God's eyes because of all the fasting he does and the money he gives to the temple. He thinks that by reminding God of the account balance God will give him his reward.

The tax collector concentrates on who he is: a SINNER, seeking forgiveness and mercy. He knows himself far better than the Pharisee is prepared to admit. God ignores outward appearance and looks at the heart; so the tax-collector finds peace with God; the Pharisee doesn't. We all want to find peace with God, and that peace depends largely on our taking a good hard look at who we really are once in a while. Today would be a good day to do that. To look beyond the criteria that

the Pharisee uses, to look at the needs and the concerns that we all share as human beings.

We wish we could be more forgiving and less resentful; we worry about health sometimes; we feel angry with God about something; we make fun of people and gossip about them. We all need to ask God to forgive us sometimes. God, be merciful to me, a sinner!
